Sir Robert Urquhart then spoke, and, after addressing a few words to the children, spoke to the parents of the difficulties overcome in the old school and how the success of the school had been assured from the outset, thanks to Miss Hincks. Mr. Greenacre and all the friends of the school. He said that parents would be proud today of the new school building, a fit place in which their children will be educated. He knew that parents had confidence in the school and the teachers and that the children would be happy there. Sir Robert said that, in the course of his career he had been called upon to open many buildings and to launch ships but never before to open a school and he thought that "the best way to do that was this" whereupon H. E. produced an apple from his pocket and presented it to the teacher, Miss Hincks.

Miss Hincks then rose to tender thanks to Their Excellencies and all concerned on behalf of the children and teachers of the school and expressed the pleasure and pride of all concerned, in the new building. She said that when she first came to Caracas on September 1st, 1950, she was told that the school was to open with 53 children on September 15th, but that there was no school building. However, with courage, faith and goodwill, the school board and parents found a home for the school in Las Mercedes and there it was opened. Miss Hincks said that she and all the staff would do all in their power to carry on the good work started there. She then briefly addressed the children for, as she said, there would be no school without the boys and girls.

Mr. Norman, the Canadian Ambassador followed, and spoke to the children. He told them that they should care for their new school as if it were a new baby brother or sister. They should, as if they were running a race, look forward and keep going. He then called for three cheers for Mr. Greenacre, President of the school board.

After the singing of the Venezuelan National Anthem and "God Save the Queen", parents and friends then made an inspection of the new building, admiring the light and airy classrooms, the open-air theatre with outdoor stage and amphitheatre, the playing field, the library and office, the teachers room, first aid room and Headmistresses room.

In the booklet prepared for the opening of the building, the school board acknowledge their indebtedness to a number of business interests who have given financial support, to Mr. A. W. van Kleef, member of the board, who was responsible for the basic design and lay-out of the new building, Dr. J. L. Vaamonde, who technically prefected the plans and C. A. Constructora La Venezolana (Clave), contractors who carried out the work, and a number of other friends, of the school.



G. W. Greenacre RECIBIRA LA ORDEN DEL IMPERIO BRITANICO



En la lista de honores de cumpleaños publicada el 31 de mayo se anunció que Su Majestad la Reina Isabel II ha concedido a G. W. Greenacre, empleado de Tesorería de la Oficina de Caracas, la Orden del Imperio Británico, en reconocimiento de sus actividades en la Escuela Británica de Caracas.

G. W. Greenacre nació en Londres, el 23 de diciembre de 1908. Comenzó a trabajar en la Shell en octubre de 1925. Primero desempeñó un cargo en el Departamento de Correspondencia de la Anglo-Saxon Petroleum Company, y luego pasó al Departamento de Contabilidad de la misma empresa.

En mayo de 1933 fue transferido a Venezuela y se le asignó la Sección de Auditoría Interna del Depto. de Contabilidad de Maracaibo; como Auditor de Campo visitó todos los Campos de la Compañía en la División Occidental.

En 1934 fue transferido a Trinidad, donde estuvo diez años. Durante la guerra, además del desempeño de su cargo hizo el servicio militar como Oficial de las Fuerzas Armadas de Trinidad.

G. W. Greenacre volvió a Venezuela en octubre de 1944 para hacerse cargo del Depto. de Impuestos y Auditoría de la Shell y tuvo a su cargo todos los asuntos relacionados con el impuesto sobre la renta de la Compañía, hasta su designación como Contador de la Colon Development Company en abril de 1954. En agosto del mismo año fue nombrado también Secretario Asistente de esa compañía.

Fue fundador de la Escuela Británica; desde poco después de la fundación de la escuela en 1950 ha formado parte de la Junta Directiva y desde 1952 es su presidente. Su interés constante en el desenvolvimiento del plantel le ha merecido la distinción de que ha sido objeto.

HONOURS AND AWARDS

Mr. R. E. Hales, C.B.E.

Mr. R. E. Hales, Managing Director of Sarawak Oilfields Ltd. and of The British Malayan Petroleum Company, was made a Commander of the Order of the British Empire, in the recent Birthday Honours List, for public service in Borneo.

Mr. Hales joined Shell-Mex Limited in 1926, and thereafter served in Mexico, the Netherlands and Egypt. During the war he was engaged in important work at Stanlow and Shell Haven Refineries, and afterwards became Refinery Manager at Suez. He was Manager of The Anglo-Egyptian Oilfields Ltd. before taking over his present position.

MR. G. W. GREENACRE, M.B.E.

It was announced in the Birthday Honours List that Mr. G. W. Greenacre, of the Treasury Department of the Compañía Shell de Venezuela, Caracas, has been made a Member of the Order of the British Empire.

Mr. Greenacre receives this award for his activities in connexion with the creation and development of the British School in Caracas; he became a member of its Board of Governors shortly after its foundation in 1950, and has been Chairman of the Board since 1952.

Mr. Greenacre joined the Group in 1925, working with The Anglo-Saxon Petroleum Company in London until 1933, when he was transferred to Maracaibo and worked as Field Auditor in the Western Division of Venezuela. In 1934 he was sent to Trinidad, where he was assistant accountant in U.B.O.T., now The Shell Company of Trinidad Ltd. During the war he did part-time military service as an officer of the Trinidad forces. He returned to Venezuela in 1944, being assigned to the head office in Caracas, where he was in charge of income-tax matters until 1954, when he was appointed Accountant and Assistant Secretary of the Colon Development Company Ltd.
